1. STRING CROSSING	<b>CROSSING 'TWICE OVER'</b> – when the open string note is surrounded by two notes on a different string, we use 4 <sup>th</sup> finger on that string to avoid unnecessary string crossing twice over.	→ AVOIDING UNNECESSARY STRING CROSSING	
2. VIBRATO PHRASING	WARMER SOUND – when playing a singing (usually slower, 2 <sup>nd</sup> theme) phrase with vibrato on all the notes, we avoid playing an open string and play a 4 <sup>th</sup> finger (or any substituting finger on a different position for that note) with vibrato.	→ AVOIDING VIBRATO 'GAPS' IN THE SOUND	
3. DOUBLE-STOPS / CHORDS	<b>INTERVALS READING</b> – when playing intervals in double-stops or chords sequences we use 4 <sup>th</sup> finger instead of open string in cases where two, three, or four notes need to be played each on a different string (especially when there are more than one open strings notes in a chord – one has to be exchanged for a finger).	→ READING EACH NOTE ON A SEPARATE STRING
